Staff, pupils and parents celebrate yet another year of superb results

The Rowans results have outperformed national alternative provision results by a

considerable margin.

The Rowans pupils' are celebrating another year of successful results. The Rowans' pupils outperformed the national average for Alternative Provision (AP) across all regions, with 93% of Year 11's achieving five or more GCSEs or equivalent, compared to the latest available national average for AP schools of 12.3%. At least one GCSE or equivalent was achieved by 100% of pupils, compared to the latest national average for AP of 57.7

A huge 29% of pupils achieved 5 or more GCSEs 9-4 (A*-C) including English and Maths. This is in comparison to the national AP average of 1.1%.

All pupils have a post 16 destination and Katie Martin, Head of KS4, said "Our pupils have achieved so much during their time at The Rowans, some have been with us for less than a year and have worked hard to achieve. All pupils will follow a pathway which is suited to their level, and I am pleased to be working so closely with our colleagues in other provisions. Many pupils are looking forward to following courses at Mid Kent College including Ciar



who has secured her place on the Level 3 Sport and Exercise Science Course. Connie has chosen another pathway and has been selected to complete her apprenticeship in a local nursery, whilst Ryan will attend the 6th form at The Howard School in Rainham, where he will study for his A Level courses"

Deputy Head, Fiona May said, "These results are testament to the hard work and commitment of both the pupils and the amazing staff team who work tirelessly and selflessly to ensure that all pupils are inspired to achieve."

Headteacher Caron Johnson, echoed these words and added, "I am so very proud of everyone who has worked extremely hard to ensure that our pupils have the very best chances of success in the future. At The

After I've listened to some reading I like to assist with some Lego construction. I help by picking up any bits that are dropped onto the floor!



We are very proud of all their achievements, being successful in the working world is not easy and our pupils have showed resilience and determination to get the most out of their 12 weeks work experience.


Artat The Rowans'

There have been some great additions to the DT team this year and I am very excited to welcome Mr Hake, Mr Mansford and Mr Miller to join Mr Rayner and I within The Rowan's DT department. Mr Hake has joined us to teach BTEC Engineering, BTEC Construction and Key Stage 3 STEM; and the pupils are loving the opportunity to learn about, and experiment, with more metal and electronics themed projects. Mr Miller has officially joined us this year as an apprentice TA within the DT department and has undoubtedly done a fantastic job so far in supporting me, and Mr Hake, in our lessons; it is an honour to have such a talented ex-pupil become a member of staff. And finally, Mr Mansford has recently joined us as a TA / Technician from Greenacre; bringing with him even more experience, expertise and ideas to help our amazing department grow and grow!

So much fantastic work has been produced throughout the department over the last two terms and pupils have really 'steppedup' in their level of effort, creativity and professionalism to produce a whole range of amazing products. Here is a taste of what we have been up to...







In our Engineering lessons, we have been looking at the health and safety involved in the School workshop, but we have also been focusing on how it is covered in industry. Students have completed their first health and safety unit for Engineering, and have no progressed onto their practical elements, where they have also completed their first project; the sliding bevel. The attached photo is a fine example of this, by JLaw who is turning into an excellent Engineer, having never before carried out these processes. The group have now progressed onto their mechanical clamps, where the focus is pillar drill accuracy, and learning how to tap and create screw threads.

Within the STEM lessons, students have designed and manufactured their own oil burners from aluminium, and once again, they have been introduced to new skills such as metal finishing, using the guillotine, screw threads and forging sheet metal. The designs were excellent, and many have produced outstanding final products.

Our second STEM project has focused on the research and design of controllers for games consoles, where students have researched, designed and manufactured their own games controller,

based on ergonomics and design features. Once again, some outstanding effort has gone into producing these models, and the top 6 chosen, will receive a BRONZE CREST AWARD for STEM. Winners to be announced!
