Science Week @ The Rowans

The theme for this year's British Science week was "Our Diverse Planet" Celebrating the diversity of life and knowledge in the Sciences. We kicked off Science week by inviting ZooLab back for the second year in a row who brought along some fury and cold blooded guests to teach key stage 3 about biodiversity. Pupils in all KS3 classes handled slimy snails, creepy cockroaches and even a terrifying



tarantula. Fun facts from the session include that a cockroach can survive without a head for up to 3 weeks. And an adult African land snail can weigh 32kgs when fully grown! The engagement of the pupils with the animals was fantastic and a lot was learnt about these creatures in their natural habitats



Throughout the week, pupils in Key stage 3 also enjoyed first hand experiences of the diverse applications of scientific knowledge while also considering some careers it may lead to. The Medway Education Business Partnership delivered a number of sessions in the hall to KS3 students. completing activities like the tetrahedron challenge. A construction task where pupils create multiple tetrahedron structures and keep adding them together to make a larger Other groups tried their hand at macro structure. entrepreneurship creating houses out of Lego with priced components sticking to tight budgets and deadlines to simulate a real life business scenario. The final session of the week, the RISK-IT challenge, had pupils create from scratch a useful product that could be marketed and sold to a target audience. The creativity and innovation on display was exceptional, ideas ranging from a runaway alarm clock to get you out of bed, to the prizewinning design of the Coronavirus hand shaker to encourage social

distancing. The ideas were truly inspirational.

Finally pupils have been engaging in a cross curricular activity to design and create a bird feeder that will add to our school sites biodiversity. In STEM students have created a design brief and considered the target market for such a product. In D.T students have created wooden stands and utilised recycled materials to create bird feeders. In Food lessons, nutritious lard balls for birds have been prepared and in Science we have been studying endemic bird species that may come and visit the final product.

Science week has again been a massive success at the Rowans and we would like to thank all involved for the varied and enriching activities we have enjoyed.

The Rowans Annual Careers Fair was, yet again, a great success. To start the day we had an extended form time to review all the providers and complete a pre-visit provider checklist. Pupils personalised their checklists, after discussions in their form groups, thinking about what their career aspirations are and what providers they most wanted to speak to first. All pupils visited the careers fair assisted by staff to gain the very most from their interactions with the wide variety of providers that came and visited our school. We had providers from the Army, Navy, Police, Fire brigade, NHS, Lloyds bank, apprenticeship providers, NCS, MidKent college, Canterbury Christchurch University and many more. Pupil feedback included; comments on learning about the many parts of the Navy and that they have their own football teams, that providers gave them good advice about their future careers, 'I got different ideas and advice for my future and I got to talk about apprenticeships that I am interested in'. Since the careers fair, pupils have been updating their aspirations with their form tutors and setting new ones or reviewing how to achieve any not already met.











Mathletics House Event




"Our Head Boy Bob start off quite reluctant to listen to another student read as he said it would be 'boring' and 'awkward'.
