

ICPAP Updates









At ICPAP, we cannot believe that it is nearly the start of the new year. We have had an action-packed initial 2 terms and want to share them with you. Term 1 saw our children exploring the underwater world through the oceans around us. In English, the children read a range of texts such as Tiddler, The Rainbow Fish and Flotsam. Using these as their stimulus, they were able to write diary recounts, create sets of instructions and produce non-fiction pages on a range of sea-creatures. In science, they explored life under the surface, investigating food-webs and examining what could happen if the oceans continue to be polluted. In art, the boys used clay to model a reef and used a range of media to blend colours to represent a wave. The boys loved going to the Hastings Aquarium to see the fish up close and to embed all of the learning that they had accomplished over the course of the term. In addition to the topic of oceans, the class were given the opportunity to go horse-riding at Squirrels riding centre and rock-climbing at Lower Grange Farm, both of which they absolutely loved and gained so much from.

Our topic for Term 2 is Autumn and Winter. The children have loved exploring nature at this time of year and investigating why the leaves change colour and the different seasons we experience. They engaged brilliantly with pumpkin carving and enjoyed creating spooky faces that looked really effective once the lights had been turned out and the flickering flame was the only source of light. The children had never experienced bobbing for apples before, but were so determined to lift them out of the water using only their teeth; they demonstrated excellent resilience and perseverance skills. The class loved learning about Guy Fawkes and were able to learn and recite the poem 'remember remember the fifth of November'. As well as English and maths, the boys have started to learn to swim at Oaklands school. They have developed their confidence in the water and are beginning to be able to swim the front crawl and backstroke. They have also had the opportunity to go trampolining at Medway Valley Park, where they are starting to put together their own routines, based upon the individual skills that they have been taught. Term 3 will see the boys starting to learn about the dinosaurs! We are so excited that The Inspiring Change Primary SEN provision opened in September and we have welcomed five fantastic children into the provision. It has been an incredible first two terms with all staff and children getting to know each other and embracing new learning and experiences. A new staff team led by Mrs Bowley have been excited to start this provision from scratch, developing the curriculum and learning opportunities. It has been a lot of hard work for the team, but seeing the children engaged and making progress has made it all worthwhile. Whilst we have been learning and working hard in lessons, we have also been able to take part in enrichment activities such as celebrating Guy Fawkes night and Halloween and visits to the park and Reindeer Centre. The children have really impressed us with their eagerness to learn and make positive choices and we are proud of each of them for their determination and resilience. It is important for us to recognise that learning isn't always easy and these children have persevered and made strides in all areas. We are immensely proud of them.





















Parents and carers are always kept updated with the use of Tapestry, which means they can see the learning that has taken place each day and feel part of the journey. All children are keen to earn their 'dojo' points to get their chosen reward and we have celebrated some amazing pieces of work throughout this first part of the year. We are especially proud of CJ, for his football poetry and how kind and encouraging he can be to his friends; of Mark, for always tackling learning with enthusiasm using and joining in games with his classmates; of Mackenzie, for his amazing effort in Maths and attitude towards of his learning, of Skylar, for always being a great friend, and of Dexter, for his creativity and imagination, especially in Art and DT, and for being a good friend. Well done everyone. We are excited about our end of term plans and the build up to Christmas. There are lots of exciting things for us to look forward to including the pantomime, Christmas dinner, a visit from the Naughty Elf and our end of term Christmas party. We can't wait to see Mr Gardner's dance moves at the party!

Aspirations and Careers

Supporting and preparing pupils at The Rowans, for their next steps is an integral part of our curriculum. All key stage 3 pupils set aspirational targets, each term, these are small building blocks to help them grow academically or personally to develop skills, knowledge and understanding. This term we celebrated 14 pupils all achieving their targets – this was an amazing achievement!

In years 10 and 11, pupils are given independent careers advice to support them make decisions about their post 16 destinations. This could be college, an apprenticeship or employment. Alongside this, pupils are also given a mentor. This is a member of staff who help and advise them with applications, interviews and keeping on track with qualifications to ensure they have the grades necessary for their planned next steps.

Year 10 had the opportunity to go to work experience at the end of term 1 and there were some huge successes with pupils at the following placements: Laicey thrived at Greenwich Leisure LTD, while Brandon and Leo showcased their skills at Soccer Elite. Harley honed his expertise at Bexley Garage, Bailey nurtured young minds at Catkins Nursery, and Angel contributed to the learning environment at King William Nursery. The list continued with Bamore at Saxon Engineering, Charlie at Royal Mail, Kaiden at K9 Dip n Clip, Max at The Poachers Pocket, and Harry at Mick's MOTs. Even Indiana from Year 11 demonstrated enthusiasm, completing a rewarding week at Catkins Nursery. Two pupils impressed the employers so much that they are now doing extended work placements, alongside attending school.

All pupils showed the school's core values of kindness, commitment and resilience.









Cinema Trip

In term two, the English department were delighted to run a series of reward trips to the cinema. Lucky pupils got to go to screenings of either Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles: Mutant Mayhem, Paddington or Puss In Boots: The Last Wish. Attendance

Regular attendance is essential if pupils are to achieve their full potential. We expect all pupils to have good attendance. The attendance target for all pupils is at least 96%.


Parents/Carer Responsibilities:

- Parents/carers must telephone the school on the first day of absence and subsequent days thereafter. It is essential that the school is notified of any absence by telephone or text by 8:30am.
- If an absence is longer that two days, medical evidence must be provided.

Uniform

All pupils are asked to wear full school uniform to school every day. This is black below the waist, shoes or trainers (no sliders), Rowans polo shirt and a Rowans jumper.

Reminder: Uniform can be bought directly from school, with payment to be made using the School Gateway. The cost of uniform is heavily subsidised by the school to make it affordable.






