COVID 19 Risk assessment September 2021

Update January 2022

This applies whether vaccinated or not:

If you have a positive LFD test but NO symptoms:

You no longer need a PCR test to confirm.

Staff report this result to NHS and inform Mrs May.

You take the day of the positive test as day 0.

On day 5 you take a further LFD test. Staff should report this result to Mrs May – whether positive or negative. This must be taken early enough in the morning that you can return to work on day 6 if both tests are negative.

24 hours later, on day 6, you take a further LFD test. This result must be reported to Mrs May so we know whether you will be in work.

If your test on day 5 and day 6 were both negative you return to work on day 6 (therefore you must take the tests early enough in the morning both days).

If either test is positive you continue testing until you have 2 negative tests 24 hours apart OR on day 10 (whichever is sooner). You must continue to let the school contact know your LFD result each day.

This only applies if you are double-vaccinated (and at least 2 weeks have passed since your second jab):

If someone in your household tests positive or you have close contact with someone who tests positive:

You do not need to isolate.

Take daily lateral flow tests for 7 days or until 10 days after contact with the person (whichever is longer). If one of these is positive or you develop symptoms then please follow advice above. If these remain negative you can continue working.

If you are **not** double-vaccinated (or 2 weeks have not passed since your second jab):

If someone in your household tests positive or you have close contact with someone who tests positive:

You need to isolate immediately. If you have been contacted by Test & Trace email the message to the school.

Take a LFD test. If you test positive, see the advice above. If negative, you must still continue to isolate (this also applies if you take a PCR test).

If unsure, contact 119 for advice as to how long your isolation period should be. This is likely to be 10 days, although this may change if anyone further in your household tests positive. **Keep us updated as to when you can return to work.**

This applies whether vaccinated or not:

If you have symptoms (with or without a positive LFD test):

Isolate and book a PCR test and inform the school contact. If at all possible please book a walk-in test as a key worker in order that you get results back more quickly.

When you receive the email with results, send to School. If negative, return to work as soon as possible (including coming in late that day if received late morning).

If positive, take the day of the onset of symptoms as day 0.

On day 5 you take a further LFD test. Please report this result to school contact – whether positive or negative. This must be taken early enough in the morning that you can return to work on day 6 if both tests are negative.

24 hours later, on day 6, you take a further LFD test. This result must be reported to school contact 7:00-7:20am so we know whether you will be in work.

If your test on day 5 and day 6 were both negative and you don't have a temperature you return to work on day 6 (therefore you must take the tests early enough in the morning both days!).

If either test is positive you continue testing until you have 2 negative tests 24 hours apart OR on day 10 (whichever is sooner and as long as you don't have a temperature). You must continue to let the school know your LFD result each day.

If you are still unwell then you report your absence as you usually would (by 2pm each day).

The key message will remain the same and should be used regularly and routinely by all staff – "Safe space and clean hands".

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- A designated room (next to room 5)to locate suspected cv19 individual with protocol in place, good ventilation, good space separation, whilst still being looked after, if close contact required we use face mask FP2, full visor, and disposable gloves
- Staff must book a test on the day on which the symptoms are reported
- Designated staff have been trained in the control and management of those with identified cv19 symptoms and have a supply of PPE
- The school refuse pupil entry to school if we believe they present an infection control risk such as having symptoms but their parents still insisting to send into school
- We will support remote work and education for those isolating

When to self-isolate

- Self-isolate straight away and get a <u>PCR test (a test that is sent to the lab)</u> on <u>GOV.UK</u> as soon as possible if you have any of these 3 symptoms of COVID-19, even if they are mild:
- A. a high temperature
- B. a new, continuous cough
- C. a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste
- Self-isolation includes the day your symptoms started or the day you had the test if you had no symptoms, and the next 10 full days

You should also self-isolate straight away if:

- you've tested positive for COVID-19 this means you have the virus
- someone you live with has symptoms or tested positive (unless you are not required to self-isolate – check below if this applies to you)
- you've been told to self-isolate following contact with someone who tested
 positive find out what to do if you're told to self-isolate by NHS Test and
 Trace or the NHS COVID-19 app
 Information:

You may need to quarantine when you arrive in England from abroad. Check the quarantine rules when entering England on GOV.UK

When you do not need to self- isolate

- If someone you live with has symptoms of COVID-19, or has tested positive for COVID-19, you will **not need** to self-isolate **if any** of the following apply:
- A. you're fully vaccinated this means 14 days have passed since your final dose of a COVID-19 vaccine given by the NHS
- B. you're under 18 years, 6 months old
- C. you're taking part or have taken part in a COVID-19 vaccine trial
