

Subject Focus: Art

Creativity across the curriculum

This term, pupils have been working hard to complete their Pop Art coursework. The pupils have been developing and refining their own ideas, as well as experimenting with a variety of materials. The final pieces are varied and original which reflect the pupils' individual strengths and interests.







This term, KS3 have been having fun making 3D sculptures in response to the theme 'Making the ordinary, extraordinary.' The pupils began the topic by researching the Pop artist Claes Oldenburg. They took inspiration from his larger-than-life sculptures of ordinary everyday objects, designing and making their own. The pupils experimented with a variety of modelling materials, including papier mâché, to create unique and colourful outcomes.





Subject Focus: DT From Planning to Production

The DT ASDAN pupils have continued to impress the DT department this term with their amazing carpentry and joinery skills. They have each designed and made a children's step stool for a target customer of their choice, learning to manufacture a variety of wood joints and discovering facts about different types of timber. The outcomes are fantastic, with each stool made to a high standard and personalised to the child's interests.



It has been busy in DT recently with pupils working in a variety of materials, and building on their prior learning, to develop more complex designs and explore new manufacturing processes. Our latest project has involved combining acrylic within cast pewter to create these beautiful keyring and emblems. The DT team has been blown away by the creative ideas, hard work and stunning outcomes that pupils have produced!

Pupils this term have been competing n The Great Rowans Bake Off. Pupils have spent the term putting a ot of time and energy into designing and planning their final pieces which were judged on the 9th of December.

Alongside the amazing creations of their cakes, which have all turned out wonderfully, pupils have created additional items which focus on key baking skills. These include; hot chocolate stirrers, peppermint creams and coconut ice. Pupils then backaged them and created food hampers to take home to share with their family and friends this Christmas.

KS4 pupils have in addition helped to prepare for Christmas dinner for the whole school, as well as the weekly school dinners which are voted for by pupils.





Cooking Club has been full every week since it started in October, with pupils creating a range of meals to take home to feed their families. Dishes have included, red lentil curry, tomato and pepper pasta soup and smoky bacon pasta. We have focused on budget meals, which use up food that's been donated by Marks and Spencer as well as unused items from food lessons. We have also learned about the importance of climate change and how reducing food waste can help, whilst saving money to create healthy balanced meals.

Throughout terms 1 and 2 pupils have been able to enjoy a range of hot meals as well as desserts each week chosen by the student voice. The Student Council prepared voting slips for pupils to cast their votes on which hot meals and desserts they would like; the top choices were selected and put on the menu. So far pupils have enjoyed meals such as Chinese curry, pasta bake, sausage and mash and chilli con carne.

World Mental Health Day and Anti-Bullying Week

On World Mental Health Day 2022 pupils spent the afternoon in their form groups learning about their amazing brains and how they keep them safe. They analysed their own responses to when the amygdala activates the survival response and looked into flight, fight, freeze and fawn modes. All done whilst enjoying some drinks and biscuits. Through understanding how the brain works we can all have a better understanding of our own mental health.



This year's anti-bullying week had the theme of Reach Out.

We started the week with odd socks day to spread awareness of anti-bullying week. On Wednesday afternoon, pupils stayed in form groups and had hot chocolate and biscuits whilst discussing various elements of bullying and its effects, including cyberbullying and being an upstander and not a bystander. Each form group wrote their own pledge of actions they were willing to take to help eradicate bullying. On Thursday, pupils filled out a survey about bullying which will be used in PSHE lessons. We finished the week with a kindness day. Pupils and Staff raised money for Children in Need with a cake sale and tag day. To finish off the week, pupils who received a kindness point on their day-sheets got to leave school earlier than normal.







<u>Samaritans Shoe Box Appeal</u>

Christmas at The Rowans started with our school value of kindness being shown in abundance with a school council volunteering trip to Samaritans Purse shoebox sorting depot. Pupils worked extremely hard following the very strict shoebox checking processes. They worked as a team with each member completing a different task such as: posting donations into the safe box, checking the boxes didn't contain unlisted items such as food in them, making sure they were age appropriate and then using packing skills to get as many shoeboxes in to the world-wide transport containers. The shoeboxes are going all around the world to countries affected by drought, floods and war. It was great to see our pupils helping other children to receive a Christmas surprise this year. We felt extremely proud to be able to help. One pupil stated that it was making them feel very happy to be able to help other children receive a Christmas present this year. It was such a great experience; the student council are planning to volunteer again next year.



Wear it Pink Fundraiser

Our annual fundraising event for the 'Breast Cancer Now' charity was a huge success.

Our Student Council members managed to raise an outstanding £207 by partaking in a Wear it Pink tag day, pink raffle and selling sweetie-cones at break time. In addition, lesson 5 activities included a pink pamper room and games of dodgeball. We are so happy to support such a worthy cause and would like to extend a huge THANK YOU to all pupils, families and staff who support our charity events.



Primary Update

The first two terms of the year have been really busy at ICPSS, working with new children and helping members of the class successfully transition to new schools. We continue to offer English, maths, reading and SPaG at the Primary and we come to The Rowans to access art, craft, humanities, cookery and PE. These lessons are delivered by a combination of Rowans and ICPSS staff, which helps us to build strong community and professional links and allows the children to be able to continually access high quality teaching.









In addition to this, the primary children have learnt how to ride at the Squirrels Riding School, on Bluebell Hill and been encouraged to put together a trampolining routine at the Jumpers Rebound Centre in Gillingham. At Great Leaps, they have continued to build upon and develop their survival skills, recognising which plants they can safely eat and how to build a shelter that will keep them dry and warm. ICPSS now has 7 children on roll and supports a further 2 children during the week by offering these additional activities.

Our Term 1 topic was the ocean, which the children seemed to enjoy very much and currently we are looking at Autumn and Winter which will then link on to Christmas.

The school also likes to support national and international events and have collected items to make up a Christmas shoebox for the Samaritans Shoe Box Appeal as well as this, we raised money for Children in Need and worn pink for breast cancer.









Great Leaps

During Term 2 a group of KS3 pupils have had the opportunity to attend Great Leaps and take part in a bushcraft carousel. They have been taught which plants they could survive on in the wild, and more importantly which ones not to eat. Some brave pupils even tried some of the edible plants and were surprised that they tasted so good. Pupils have been using knives and saws to create mallets and spoons, whilst learning about knife laws and safety and finding out how to create fire without matches or a lighter. During the last week they used all of the skills that they had learnt to cook us all a full English breakfast, delicious!



Throughout Term 2, the primary children have been exploring nature, the environment around them and how to use natural resources to their advantage. They started their activities by playing wild games on the Buckmore Park site, getting used to their environment and exploring what it has to offer in a safe way. The children were then tasked with using sticks, branches, leaves and mud to create a shelter. They had to work as part of a team and ensure that their shelter was large enough to keep them all dry! Most recently, the class were able to take advantage of the wet and muddy conditions to find and identify the tracks of animals. They found badger, fox and rabbit footprints and even saw evidence of the new shoots of brambles that had been eaten by Muntjac deer.



Turner Contemporary Art Trip

During term 2 GCSE Art and Textiles pupils had the exciting opportunity to visit the Turner Contemporary Gallery in Margate. Pupils participated in a navigated tour and workshop where they were able to create a fantastical landscape based on the exhibition. Pupils and staff also experienced a unique virtual reality exhibition. Fun was had by all and we look forward to visiting again in the near future.





Cinema Trips

As part of the Into Film Festival 2022, pupils from GHa, HB, LKi and KH had the opportunity to go to the cinema. The festival aims to bring learning to life by inspiring young people to watch, understand and create films in creative ways. Pupils enjoyed a wide range of films including The Railway Children, Jurassic World and Minions.

The New Sensory Room

We have a new designated sensory space at The Rowans AP which will support pupils' sensory preferences and needs. It is a space which aims to provide pupils with the individualised sensory input they need to self-regulate, so they can be better prepared for learning and interacting with others. The sensory space will benefit all pupils, especially those who have been exposed to trauma, stress and those with specified

sensory needs. The sensory space will provide a safe environment where pupils can be supported to calm and regulate, therefore optimising learning and participation in the school environment.

The Sensory Space is flexible, changeable and adaptable and will be used for interventions, a quiet working space or somewhere to take some time out from the day.





Construction Centre of Excellence

At the Rowans, we are fortunate enough to have some outstanding facilities, however, none more so than the recently refurbished Construction workshop.

Over the summer, members of the Construction department applied their skills and knowledge to convert an extremely run down, leaking, aged, almost derelict container, into a fully functioning, water-tight teaching space! The workshop is used to carry out several activities, including plumbing, electrical installation and tiling as part of the Construction course delivered at the school. The workshop contains 6 station rigs, a hot work area and a site office, which is used to promote the feeling and atmosphere of being on a live construction site.

The workshop is also used to carry out architectural drawings and planning for the Designing the Built Environment course, which uses some of the facilities recently installed.

Afternoon tea deliveries are a regular Friday afternoon treat for our local community. Pupils have been delivering afternoon teas for over two years now and it is still a delight to chat to elderly members of our local community and deliver a box full of goodies to share.
