What and Gangs and County Lines?

County Lines is where illegal drugs are transported from one area to another, often across police and local authority boundaries (although not exclusively), usually by children or vulnerable people who are coerced into it by gangs. The 'County Line' is the mobile phone line used to take the orders of drugs.

How do county lines target children?

What are the risks of county lines?

Warning signs of drug activity

Gangs often leave signs of their presence and your child might adopt some of these signs; either as a member or as an associate of a gang. Any sudden changes in your child's lifestyle should be discussed. Signs may include:

Specific dress style
Poor behaviour
Talking differently - now slang or

Talking differently – new slang or language with an aggressive tone

Poor school results or skipping school

Carrying weapons

Unexplained injuries or sums of money/possessions

Staying out unusually late

Graffiti style tags on possessions

Interest in music which glorifies

weapons/gang culture

Gangs will often have profiles on social or networking websites like Facebook or Twitter

SERIOUS YOUTH VIOLENCE PROJECT

Salus are working with Kent County Council, Medway Council and Kent Police to deliver a Serious Youth Violence Project in North Kent (Dartford, Gravesham, Sevenoaks and Swale) and Medway.

In Kent and Medway, violence against the person increased by 20% in 2019 and recent years have shown increased incidents of young people carrying knives. We have seen a steady increase in gangs – from mostly London-based street gangs venturing into Kent to sell drugs, to the development of local 'home grown' gangs – and the grooming of vulnerable individuals by gang members.

Although less than 1% of Kent's young people come into contact with the Criminal Justice System, they can have a disproportionately negative influence on wider society.

Who is the project for?

Children and young people between the ages of 10-17 years who are at risk of being, or are already involved in, serious youth violence, gangs and County Lines.

What do we deliver?

Prevent: targeted support and diversionary activities for children and young people 'at risk'

Protect: intensive and long term support to children and young people who are already thought to be involved in violent activities, and their families

Awareness: raising awareness amongst children, young people, families, schools, communities and professionals

All young people will be supported by a Youth Mentor.
